• Narrative Report

Clinical Expertise

I am a psychiatrist who specializes in the care of oncology patients. After completing my training in psychiatry at Massachusetts Mental Health Center and at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital as a fellow I joined the faculty at the Brigham, Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and HMS, where I provide psychiatric consultation, treatment and referral for oncology patients and their family members, supervise trainees, teach courses, and conduct scholarly work at the interface between medicine and spirituality to enhance our knowledge and the quality of patient care. As an Institute Physician I have served in a number of leadership positions helping to grow what has become a well-recognized interdisciplinary model of care at the Dana-Farber Brigham Cancer Center. I am currently DFCI Site Director of the BWH Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry Fellowship, have co-direct the Harvard Medical School Psychosocial Oncology and Palliative Medicine Elective (the most subscribed psychiatry elective) and supervise consultation-liaison and psychiatry palliative care fellows. Recognized as a Boston's Top Doctor for fire years, I am a Fellow of the American Psychosocial Oncology Society, and a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association.

Scholarship

Witnessing early in my career how often cancer patients draw upon spiritual resources, and how infrequently these are acknowledged by the treatment team stimulated my interest in what has become a major clinical and scholarly focus, as well as a source of my international reputation - helping clinicians over the world better understand their role in engaging with the existential and moral aspects of care.

In the 1990s I began collaborating with colleagues in presenting symposia and a course addressing these issues at the American Psychiatric Association (APA)'s Annual Meeting, and in co-editing a 2004 book on the clinical implications of world view. I have since chaired the APA's Corresponding Committee on Spirituality, Religion and Psychiatry, and until recently chaired the APA Caucus on Spirituality, Religion and Psychiatry, where I remain active on the Executive Committee. Given that clergy are the first providers for many individuals, and that cultural and religiously reinforced stigma impedes access to mental health treatment, I have also worked with faith leaders and chaplains, most recently through the APA's Mental Health and Faith Community Partnership, and the Section on Religion, Spirituality and Psychiatry of the World Psychiatric Association (WPA). In addition to publishing numerous papers in these areas I co-edited two books published by Oxford University Press, Religious and Spiritual Issues in Psychiatric Diagnosis: A Research Agenda for DSM-V, and Spirituality and Religion within the Culture of Medicine: From Evidence to Practice, and have co-edited a series of books published by Springer Nature, Islamophobia and Psychiatry, Anti-Semitism and Psychiatry, and Christianity and Psychiatry, with Eastern Religions, Spirituality, and Psychiatry: An Expansive Perspective on Mental Health and *Illness* in press. I have co-authored with Harold Koenig and Tyler VanderWeele the Handbook of Religion and Health, 3rd edition, published by Oxford University Press. My work in these areas continues to prompt invitations to speak at local, national and international venues, including the David Larson Memorial Lecture in 2017, In 2020 I received the APA's Oskar Pfister Award, for outstanding contributions in the field of psychiatry and religion.

Challenges involving the moral and ethical aspects of practice led me to write *Doing the Right Thing: An Approach to Moral Issues in Mental Health Treatment* (APA Press), to help revise the 2006 APA Resource Document on Religious/Spiritual Commitments and Psychiatric Practice, and to co-teach Psychiatric Ethics to PGY3 residents. I also mentor students in the Harvard Bioethics Program, have researched physician assisted dying, and co-edited a volume published by Oxford University Press, *Ethical Considerations at the Intersection of Psychiatry and Religion*. I was an investigator in a multidisciplinary project funded by the Templeton Religion Trust to study the Relational Virtue of Accountability which led to four of my co-authored

publications on the relevance of this virtue in medicine and psychiatry, and in 2022 edited a book, *The Virtues in Psychiatric Practice* (Oxford). I am the lead author of a recent successful submission to the DSM Steering Committee proposing the addition of Moral Problem (moral injury, distress or dilemma) to the current Z-Code for Religious or Spiritual Problem.

Teaching and Mentorship

I have been actively involved in teaching and supervision of medical students and residents since I joined the BWH/HMS faculty, including co-leading BWH site visits for the HMS Mind, Brain and Behavior course. In 1998 I initiated with Dr. Mary McCarthy a semester long course for PGY4 psychiatry residents, Spirituality, Religion and Psychiatry, which received a John Templeton Foundation curriculum award and has led to additional teaching and mentoring opportunities both in the U.S. and abroad. Since 2006, I have also co-directed a Harvard Medical School/Harvard Divinity School elective Spirituality, Healing and Medicine, and co-edited the course textbook, *The Soul of Medicine: Spiritual Perspectives and Clinical Practice*. In both courses we aim to ascertain students' needs and interests, introduce them to core principles and relevant literature, and engage them in conversation with invited presenters and patients so they can apply what they are learning to clinical practice.

The impact of my work can be seen in the growing worldwide appreciation for the clinical relevance of spiritual, existential and moral issues in medicine and psychiatry. My reputation for collaborative leadership, innovative teaching and cross-disciplinary scholarship continues to result in local, national and international invitations to speak, and to come alongside and to mentor students and junior colleagues in the care of the whole patient.
